

"The Windmill Theatre" tried to continue this tradition in the 1930s, but it wasn't successful. The owners transformed it into a cinema, but without success. Finally, the theatre became a great success. Stephen Frears' 2005 film *Mrs. Henderson Presents*, tells the theatre's amazing story.


