TASK 1

Messi

Lionel Messi was born in Argentina and comes from a poor family. His father was a factory steel worker and his mother was a part-time cleaner, but nevertheless he grew up surrounded with love and support. Messi developed a great passion for football very early in his life, so at the age of five he started playing football for a local club coached by his father, and when he was eight he joined Newell Old Boys club.

Messi grew up very close with his grandmother, so when she passed away he was in a lot of pain, he was so sad that he didn't want to play football for weeks. But after his father started pushing him to continue to play, he returned on the field.

He dreamed of becoming a professional football player, but that dream started to fall apart when he was diagnosed with growth hormone deficiency. This meant that he was physically unable to grow unless he received special expensive therapy that cost nine hundred dollars per month, and unfortunately his parents couldn't afford it and the club that he was playing for refused to pay for the therapy. But even though Messi was the shortest player in his team his love for football was limitless, so Messi wasn't discouraged, this obstacle didn't stop him. Messi's talent was so undeniable that football clubs started noticing him. River Plate showed big interest in Messi, but lacked the money to sponsor his medical treatment, so at the end they rejected him because of his medical condition. But soon Messi was noticed by the coach of Football Club Barcelona. He sent an offer to Messi's family: he proposed a trial period so he could see for himself if Messi is worth the hype. If he passed the trial, the club would cover his medical bills but on one condition: Messi needs to leave his hometown and move to Spain.

Emma Watson

I was appointed as Goodwill Ambassador for U.N. Women six months ago and the more I have spoken about feminism, the more I have realized that fighting for women's rights has too often become synonymous with man-hating. If there is one thing I know for certain, it is that this has to stop. For the record, feminism by definition is the belief that men and women should have equal rights and opportunities. It is the theory of the political, economic and social equality of the sexes.

I started questioning gender-based assumptions a long time ago. When I was eight I was confused at being called "bossy" because I wanted to direct the plays that we would put on for our parents -but the boys were not. When at 14 I started to be sexualized by certain elements of the media. When at 15 my girlfriends started dropping out of their beloved sports teams because they didn't want to appear "muscly." When at 18 my male friends were unable to express their feelings.

I decided that I was a feminist and this seemed uncomplicated to me. But my recent research has shown me that feminism has become an unpopular word. Women are choosing not to identify as feminist. Apparently I am among the ranks of women whose expressions are seen as too strong, too aggressive, isolating, anti-men, unattractive even. Why has the word become such an uncomfortable one?

I am from Britain and I think it is right that I am paid the same as my male counterparts; I think it is right that I should be able to make decisions about my own body; I think it is right that women be involved on my behalf in the policies and the decisions that will affect my life; I think it is right that socially I am afforded the same respect as men.

Interview with Ben Kingsley

Interviewer: We play a game of 'If I only new', so then I just throw some questions at you ...

Kingsley: Ouch!

I: ... prepared by the staff. Most exotic place you've travelled to?

K: Morocco.

I: Where?

K: In Marrakesh, in Ouarzazate. I've filmed ... I've made nine films in Morocco, I'm very fond of it.

I: If you weren't an actor what would it be?

K: Military.

I: Favorite role to date?

K: Sexy beast

I: Oh, Sexy Beast, you were so cruel in that!

K: Yeah, but I had a secret to that performance.

I: Which was?

K: He was an abused child, that's why he was what he was like, that's why he was what he was, an unhealed abused child.

I: (no lo entiendo) to play?

K: Well, ... it was a scream that I wanted to be heard and it coincided ... sometimes your work, your craft and your inner voice coincide and you find you're so privileged to scream something at the top of your voice that otherwise you couldn't.

I: The actor or actress you'd most like to work with?

K: There's a long list, so if I name one or two I'm guilty of grave omission here. I:

The last time you were starstruck?

K: Tony Hopkins, sitting opposite me at a table in a film about to come out called 'Collide' and I had my first scene with with Sir Tony Hopkins and it's like sitting close to a volcano.

I: He's tremendous.

K: He's wonder..., I love him. I:

What was it like to be sirred? K:

Ah, ...

I: They do touch you with the sword.

K: Yeah, I'll tell you what it's like. You know as well as I do that the British find it very difficult to enthuse, the British find it very difficult to celebrate success openly and vocally, very like ... very different from New York and LA and America, where you can be greeted walking a block or two by many people. In England, if you walk into a restaurant, they will mutter behind their menus: 'there's Ben Kingsley', 'who?', 'Ben Kingsley, I'll have the fish'. But, you know, but ... what balances it, and we need this balance, is that seeming indifference where suddenly,



you know, the sovereign says, 'no no no no, we're not indifferent, we've seen what you're up. Thank you'. It's beautiful.

I: The most embarrassing moment? K:

Yet to come.

I: Pet peeves? K:

Pet peeves?

I: What bothers you?

K: Tea that's not hot enough. I:

Okay. Something ...

K: I mean, life is that beautiful, you know, that's my only peeve. I:

Something that makes you laugh?

K: Ah, Laurel and Hardy. I cry with laughter at Laurel and Hardy, because the comedy's innocent and we've lost our innocence in comedy. It's getting very aggressive and abrasive. They were like two wonderful innocent clowns. I love them.

I: Greatest film ever made in your opinion?

K: Certainly one of the greatest, and I think as time goes by we appreciate it more and more, is The Wizard of Oz. It's ... yeah, it's remarkable, remarkable film.

I: Best book you ever read?

K: Uh, it's ..., I think the best book I ever read is ... I go back to it, which is why I think I love it so much, and I still don't fully understand it. The language is so dense, the intelligence is so compressed, and it's translated from the French. It's by Albert Camus and it's his collection of essays and thoughts. It's called 'The Myth of Sisyphus'.
