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### 4. Buckfast Abbey

On first sight the grey and gold tower and blue limestone walls of Buckfast Abbey look as if they must have been standing among Devon fields and woods for at least 700 years. But this lovely church is less than a century old, part of a monastery abandoned in 1539.

### 5. Blickling Hall

The hall was built in 1616-28 on the site of Anne Boleyn's childhood home. Huge yew hedges frame the view of the symmetrical, red brick Jacobean mansion from the drive. It is homely looking in spite of its size, and surrounded by vivid flower gardens.

#### 6. Jumbo Water Tower

You can't miss it. This grand and grotesque Victorian water tower at the top of a hill is 40m above Colchester. When construction began in 1882, Jumbo the London Zoo elephant was sold to New York. A local rector, whose house was near the tower, said, 'Never mind, now I have a Jumbo in my own garden.'

### Exams, rules, timetables: do teachers know what's best for children? Increasing numbers of British parents don't think so.

The home-schooling movement emerged in the 1970s, when it was considered a fringe pursuit. Today, it is probably the fastest-growing form of education in the UK. The number of home-schooled children has risen by about 40% over three years, according to recent research by the BBC. [...]

Many parents who opt to home-school their children say they are avoiding bullying, exam pressure and stress. Others have concerns about special educational needs, not getting a place at the school of their choice, or the school environment.

Helen Lees, a specialist in alternative Education at York St John University, believes the increase suggests "something quite worrying about the state of the education system. I'm not sure having 30 children in a classroom all doing the same thing works any more. Not with the way the classroom is structured, and the way the curriculum is followed."

Changes in technology have made it easier to teach out of the classroom, [...] The father of "unschooling" US author and educator John Holt in the 1970s believed that if you give a child the freedom to follow their own interests, and a rich assortment of resources, they will do the actual learning themselves.

There are families that dip into home-education for short periods – to get into competitive secondary schools, or retake A-levels, for example. For others it is not just an interlude; it's their lives.

A recent report by the National Association of Head Teachers union highlights the pressure on headteachers to get good results on pain of being forced out, and how the emphasis on test results



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has narrowed the curriculum and made "drilling" for key stage 2 Sats\* common. Children take the test when they're around 11 and are prepared with revision classes and practice tests, sometimes even during the Easter holidays.

Critics argue that the "cocooning" desire of some home-schooling parents is fuelled by a romanticised vision of the past. "It is not just about seeking an escape from the problems of the 'city' (a metaphor for danger and heterogeneity), it is a rejection of the entire idea of a city, writes educational theorist Michael Apple. He likens home-schooling to a "gated community", mirroring the filter bubbles that have been created by the internet [...] and says, schools "provide a kind of 'social glue', a common cultural reference point in our polyglot, increasingly multicultural society."
