Gender equality is not a 'women's issue' - it's good for men too.

Men have always played critical roles in the women's movement. From John Stuart Mill to Fredrick Douglass, a few men have long supported the struggle for gender equality. And today there are plenty of men who are proud feminists – just ask Andy Murray, who hired a female coach, Amélie Mauresmo; or Ryan Gosling, who has become something of a feminist icon. But there is still a long way to go, and we'll only get there by drawing more men into the conversation.



A new study by Ipsos Mori, in collaboration with the Global Institute for Women's Leadership at King's College London, has found that while a third of British men think they are being expected to do too much to support women's equality, far more – half – do not. In fact, three in five men in Britain agree that gender equality won't be achieved unless they also take action to support women's rights.

Despite attempts to paint gender equality as a zero-sum game*, there are plenty of win-win propositions for these men to support. Better parental leave for fathers would be a good start. Sorry, Piers Morgan, but the vast majority of people who answered our survey don't believe that childcare is emasculating, with 75% of people globally disagreeing that a man who stays at home to look after his children is less of a man.

Government policy needs to catch up with this new reality, and the evidence is clear that, unless paternity leave is non-transferable and well paid, few people will use it. Sweden and Norway show us that the introduction of the "daddy quota" – the period of parental leave reserved specifically for fathers – has a positive effect on men using their parental leave, and then on men's long-term involvement in household work and childcare.

Men want employers to do more. Globally, three-quarters (72%) agree that employers should make it easier for men to combine childcare with work. We are seeing an increasing number of jobs that offer flexible working schemes to do just this, but too often they are only offered to women. Probably, the best way to change this stigma would be to encourage more men to take on part-time and flexible work. Businesses need not fear: research links flexible working to increased productivity, as better work-life balance leads to happier, more effective workers.

Women gain from having flexible partners, too. A study of German couples found that having a partner who works flexibly boosted the wages of men and women, with the effect most pronounced for mothers. Conversely, women whose partners work very long hours are significantly more likely to quit the labour force – taking their talent and experience with them.

* A zero-sum game is defined as a game in which the total gains and losses equal zero. That is, if one of the players wins something, the other players lose an equal amount so that the total sum is zero. Here, it means that, for some, if women win something, it will be at the cost of men losing something in return.

When you think of "scientific breakthroughs," you probably think of the major, history-shifting

ones. Newton's laws of gravity! Einstein's theory of relativity! Penicillin! But for every textbookworthy discovery, (0) there are a dozen more amazing revelations— most of which we hear almost nothing about. So, to help you know something about them, we've rounded up all the major breakthroughs scientists are about to discover.
DNA Storage
Many scientific breakthroughs (1) A clear example of that is DNA storage—using synthetic DNA strands to store massive amounts of data. Just as the DNA in the human body contains loads of information, research has found that a few grams of DNA can store an exabyte of data (that's one quintillion bytes for those who are counting) and hold it safely intact for thousands of years.
A Better Look at Black Holes
Though we've been able to confirm the existence of black holes by measuring motions of individual stars orbiting them, actually (2)has proven more difficult. But researchers have struck on the idea of imaging it by using a large number of radio telescopes to simultaneously measure the same objects from a wide range of locations, then putting them together (3)
Quantum Computing
Using the principles of quantum mechanics, this approach is a step up from the usual binary 0s and 1s to the more complex qubit. Running on quantum algorithms to process information, this far more powerful equipment (4) than it already is—and could help with medical and other scientific breakthroughs.
Immunotherapy Advances for Treating Cancer
No, it's unlikely the cure for cancer will come around in 2019, (5), that is, a biological treatment that uses the body's own immune system to fight cancer. The Cleveland Clinic, which includes this as a medical innovation to expect in the coming year, states: "With the near daily discovery of new immunotherapeutic targets and biomarkers, it is the hope that effective therapies will soon exist for all tumor profiles."
Flying Cars
No, you shouldn't expect to see machines similar to the sleek automobiles from your favorite sci-fi films. But you can expect this year to see developments (6) For example, the "Liberty" from Dutch company Pal-V, which uses a dual-propulsion system, allowing it to both drive and fly (as high as 11,480 feet in
the air). It's still a bit expensive, at almost \$600,000, but expect more developments to make

these more affordable soon.

California becomes first US state to ban animal fur products

California will become the first US state to (0) <u>ban</u> the sale and manufacture of new fur products and the third to bar most animals from circus performances under a pair of bills signed on Saturday by the governor, Gavin Newsom.



The law will bar residents from selling or (1) _____ clothing, shoes or handbags with fur, starting in 2023. Animal rights groups cheered the measure as a stand (2) ____ inhumane practices.

"California is a leader when it comes to (3) ____ welfare, and today that leadership include banning the sale of fur," Newsom said.

The ban could cause significant (4) ____ to the fur industry that makes products from animals including mink, chinchillas, rabbits and other animals. The US retail fur industry produced \$1.5bn in sales in 2014, the most recent data available from the Fur Information Council.

Under the California law, there is a fine of up to \$1,000 for multiple violations. Fashion designers including Versace, Gucci and Giorgio Armani have stopped or say they (5)______ to stop using fur.

Animal rights groups have said animals may be subject to gassing, electrocution and other inhumane actions to take their (6)____. Advocacy group Direct Action Everywhere said it was working with activists to pass similar bills in cities nationwide, including Minneapolis and Portland, Oregon, and was (7)_____that California's law would have a positive effect.

Opponents of the legislation have said it could create a black market and be a slippery slope to bans on other products. The ban is part of a "radical vegan agenda using fur as the first step to other bans on what we wear and eat", Keith Kaplan of the Fur Information Council said in a prior statement. He claimed fake fur was not a renewable or sustainable option.
