## **TARTAN GANGS**

An interview with Dr. Gareth Mulvenna, author of Tartan Gangs and Paramilitaries: The Loyalist Backlash

According to the host, these street gangs gained their name from their tartan scarves and the tartan <a href="PATCH">PATCH</a> [0] they wore on their denim jackets.	<b>✓</b>
Dr. Mulvenna talks about an inspiring documentary by Max Hasting in which he was [9] to the Woodstock area of Belfast.	
According to some of the people interviewed in this documentary, Tartan Gangs were defenders of loyalism and <b>[10]</b> class areas.	
Tartan Gang members were usually into Led Zeppelin, Deep Purple, Black Sabbath and some other <b>[11]</b> of the time.	
Part of their role was attending the vanguard [12], or acting as bodyguards for loyalist politicians.	
Dr. Mulvenna tries to clarify at some point that with his explanations he does not want to glorify or [13] Tartan Gangs and their history.	
According to the author, some Tartan Gang members were happy to get involved in [14].	
Tartan Gang members joined these groups for varied reasons, ranging from a bit of [15] for the 70s music to a preliminary interest on paramilitarism.	
There are different stories behind the genesis of Tartan Gangs, but the most [16] one involves Frankie Curry and the stealing of scarves.	
The Shankill Young Team, the gang to which Frankie Curry belonged, was named in [17] to the Glasgow gangs at the time.
